### FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

In the 28<sup>th</sup> chapter of Saint Matthew's gospel account, Jesus gives the Great Commission. He instructs us to go into the world making disciples for the Faith.

The reality is, Christianity in the West, particularly in North America, has done a less than stellar job of evangelizing over the past 50 or so years. This is not a uniquely Christian problem. In fact, Gallup data show that in 2020, for the first time ever in the United States, only 47% of the adult population claims membership in a church, synagogue, or mosque. This is down over 40 points since the start of the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

If we are honest with ourselves, this does not mean that over half of Americans do not have a belief system. It means they have a belief system that does not include God.

I would strongly argue that for the sake of our nation's future, this is a trend that we not only should be concerned about, but one that every local church should be actively addressing.

I want to tell you about two young people who attend Good Shepherd Church. Their names are Noah Huntley and Kristen Haynes. Both recently moved to our area after completing college studies elsewhere. Noah came to New Orleans for his first job. Kristen came here to pursue a master's degree. Both began attending Good Shepherd Church because they desired a church rooted firmly in the Gospel of Jesus Christ and in the Anglican tradition.

Noah and Kristen understand the importance of faith in their lives and in the lives of others, especially in the lives of young adults. As such, they have stepped up to help bring the Good News of the God's saving grace through Christ to local college students by helping start a campus outreach ministry at the University of New Orleans. On November 29, just at the start of final exams, Noah and Kristen plan to be on the campus of UNO handing out "end of semester survival and management gift bags" to students. The end of the fall semester, with exam and holidays looming, is always a stressful time for students. Noah and Kristen have a vision for reaching students with the love of God by simply giving them an end of semester help bag. In it will be snacks and other small items to help manage stress including a card with Bible verses that address peace and strength through God.

This is only a first step in trying to reach unchurched members of our local community, but it's a big one and one that we need your help with. If you have anything that you could donate to be included in the survival bags, such as snacks, gum, or other end of semester essentials, please bring them to church. If you would like to offer a monetary donation to help offset the cost of purchasing gift bags and other items, that too would be greatly appreciated.

In the Spring semester, Noah and Kristen have a goal of recruiting students to begin coming to a weekly meeting of something called the Alpha course. Alpha is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith with weekly talks that examine different topics designed to create conversation and explore BIG questions. Alpha is now offered around the globe by various denominations in Protestant and Roman Catholic churches, but was started by and remains rooted in the evangelical Anglican tradition.

As Noah and Kristen get the Alpha course underway at UNO in the Spring, another way members of Good Shepherd Church can help this college outreach is by volunteering to cook or provide a meal for their weekly meetings.

Please keep your eyes and ears open as Noah and Kristen keep us updated on their efforts to tackle the huge issue of unchurched Americans by starting right here in our own backyard. Please keep them and the fledgling UNO campus ministry in your prayers. And if you have any questions or feel moved to assist in any way, do not hesitate to let me know.

# HANGING OF THE GREENS

### ADVENT AND THE NEW CHURCH YEAR

For 2,000 years, the Church has been an institution that, when it has been at its best, it has remembered that it is "in the world, not of the world" and this means that it often is not in lockstep with the ways of the world.

The Church calendar is one example of how the church is different. In the world, the new

year begins on January 1. In the Church Universal, the new year begins on the first Sunday of Advent, which this year is Sunday, November 28.

Just as the material world has seasons, so too does the Church have her seasons. Advent is the first of the seasons of the Church year and is time that we prepare to celebrate the coming of the Lord and the Feast of the Nativity, also known as Christmas.

A longstanding tradition at Good Shepherd Church is something known as the Hanging of the Greens. Held annually on the Saturday before the first Sunday of Advent, this even is a time for parishioners of all ages to come together in a festive way to



decorate the sanctuary of the church for the seasons of Advent and Christmas.



# PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Since the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown began last year, Good Shepherd Church has been streaming our 10:00 AM Sunday morning Service of Holy Eucharist each week. During the distribution of Holy Communion, the lector reads a prayer entitled **An Act of Spiritual Communion** for those who are watching at home and are unable to partake in the reception of Holy Communion sacramentally. That beautiful prayer comes from the Book of Common Prayer (pg. 677, ACNA 2019) and can be prayed by a Christian any time they are longing for the grace of Holy Communion but are unable to receive the tangible elements of the sacrament. These are the words to that prayer:

Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to possess you within my soul. And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart. I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people gathered around every altar of your Church, and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
