In nature, Autumn is the season when animals such as squirrels, mice, and beavers gather up extra food supplies to help them make it through the harshness of winter. In churches, Autumn is the time when leadership begins to look to the future by planning the budget for the next calendar year. For Christians, that can only mean one thing: it's stewardship time.


NOTES FROM RINDA


Hymns are most often expressions of the composer's and author's faith. This is definitely true of the Wesley brothers, often credited with founding Methodism when they were students at Oxford because of the methods of spirituality that they introduced to their friends in a club. During the Eight-

eenth century there was a spiritual revival throughout much of Europe, and the Wesleys were a part of this.

After graduation, they decided to sail to America to minister to the colonists in Georgia, which was founded as a colony for prisoners. They were disillusioned and returned to England. On their way home they met a group of devout Moravians who greatly impressed the Wesleys with their spiritual depth and missionary zeal.

Back in London, they met with a group of Moravians at Aldersgate Hall in 1738, they both had a spiritual experience, realizing that even though they were ex-

PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Since the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown began, Good Shepherd Church has been streaming our 10:00 AM Sunday morning Service of Holy Eucharist each week. During the distribution of Holy Communion, the lector reads a prayer entitled **An Act of Spiritual Communion** for those who are watching at home and are unable to partake in the reception of Holy Communion sacramentally. That beautiful prayer comes from the Book of Common Prayer (pg. 677, ACNA 2019) and can be prayed by a Christian any time they are longing for the grace of Holy Communion but are unable to receive the tangible elements of the sacrament. These are the words to that prayer:

Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament.

I love you above all things, and I desire to possess you within my soul.

And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart.

I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people gathered around every altar of your Church, and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul.

Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
