FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

IN ALL THINGS GIVE THANKS!

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God.

<u>People</u>: It is right to give Him thanks and praise.

That prayerful exchange between the Priest and the People during the Sursum Corda of the Holy Eucharist helps frame why we celebrate Holy Communion—because we are called to

remember the Lord's sacrifice (e.g., Luke 22:19). We are also commanded to offer our own sacrifice (Hebrews 13:15, Psalm 116:17) which the Liturgy reminds us is a "sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving." In fact, the term Holy Eucharist actually means Holy Thanksgiving. The Eucharist is the thanksgiving meal of the Church—that heavenly banquet of our Lord that tears open the veil between heaven and earth, allowing us, along with angels, archangels and all the company of heaven, to sacramentally commune as one body in the presence of our Lord.

As this is November, the secular concept of thanksgiving will be evident all around us as we enjoy a day off on Thursday, November 24 to celebrate our nation's Thanksgiving holiday. But even within that secular celebration, with our eyes of faith, we can see the presence and providence of God in our midst. In fact, when the first Thanksgiving Day feast was celebrated in the New World in 1621, the pilgrims who had landed at Plymouth Rock held their celebration to offer prayers to God Almighty for His divine providence of food, shelter, and safety in their new land during the previous year.

History tells us that the pilgrims held a second Thanks-giving celebration in 1623. This celebration was in gratitude to God for the end of a drought which had compromised their crops. Interestingly, this prompted Governor William Bradford to then declare an annual day of thanksgiving in the colonies. Even more interesting is the reality that as a devout Christian of the Puritan tradition of Anglicanism, Bradford opted not declare the holiday as a feast day, but rather as day of fasting and thanksgiving. (Side note: This author wishes to express sincere gratitude that the Puritan expression of Anglicanism has all but disappeared.)

A Proclamation by the President of the United States of America.

The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added which are of so extraordinary a nature that they can not fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God.

In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to invite and provoke the aggressions of foreign states, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed every where, except in the theatre of military conflict, while that theatre has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

The needful diversions of wealth and strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense have not arrested the plow, the shuttle, or the ship. The axe has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege, and the battle-field; and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised, nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and voice by the whole American people; I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea, and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens. And I recommend to them that, while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquillity, and union.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington this third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the independence of the United States the eighty-eighth.

It was not until 1863, at the height of the American Civil War, that President Abraham Lincoln, heeding the advice of his dear friend Sarah Joseph Hale (the author of the nursery rhyme Mary Had a Little Lamb), released a proclamation entreating all of America to set aside the last Thursday in November to annually beseech God to "commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife" and to "heal the wounds of the nation." In 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in the height of the Great Depression, moved the holiday up a week in an effort to spur retail sales during that economically challenging time. While history tells us that his plan actually did help retail sales that year, it was not popular with many who derisively called it "Franksgiving." In 1941, Roosevelt signed into law a bill that officially designated the fourth Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day in our nation.

I think we'd be hard pressed to find an American who does not appreciate the Thanksgiving holiday. Yet, as a Christian, never fail to realize that every time we offer the prayer of the Holy Eucharist, we are indeed stepping into an ongoing and endless Thanksgiving celebration of the goodness of God through Christ and His precious body and blood.

A SPECIAL RECIPE FROM THE KITCHEN OF MRS. HELEN SUNDMAKER



Mrs. Helen Sundmaker (Feb 16, 1916 – Aug 26, 2014)

Preheat oven to 375

1 egg
1/4 lb. (1 stick) butter, melted
1 cup sugar
1 cup quick oatmeal
5 Tbsp. flour
1/4 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup chopped pecans

Mix all together. Place marble-sized pieces on a foil-lined cookie sheet. Bake 6-7 minutes until brown. Let cool and they will crisp.

PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

I love you above all things, and I desire to possess you within my soul.

And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart.

I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people gathered around every altar of your Church, and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul.

Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
