## **NOTES FROM RINDA**

The hymn "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee" was one of the most popular hymns during the 20th century. Like many other hymns it has a special background story.

Henry Van Dyke, a renowned Presbyterian minister, was conducting a preaching seminar at Williams College. He was staying with the president of the college. One morning he came down for breakfast and placed the hymn in front of his host. "Here is a hymn for you. Your mountains (the Berkshires) were my inspiration. It must be set to Beethoven's "Hymn to Joy."

At the turn of the century there was a strong theological emphasis in many churches on what was called the social gospel. This movement sought to promote the welfare of society more than individual salvation. This hymn placed the emphasis not on what humanity can do, but on the source of all things---God our creator.

The tune HYMN TO JOY is from Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. At the end of the symphony during the final movement a choir and soloists sings Schiller's poem "Ode to Joy."

This hymn remains one of the most beloved Christian musical offerings.

## PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Since the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown began, Good Shepherd Church has been streaming our 10:00 AM Sunday morning Service of Holy Eucharist each week. During the distribution of Holy Communion, the lector reads a prayer entitled **An Act of Spiritual Communion** for those who are watching at home and are unable to partake in the reception of Holy Communion sacramentally. That beautiful prayer comes from the Book of Common Prayer (pg. 677, ACNA 2019) and can be prayed by a Christian any time they are longing for the grace of Holy Communion but are unable to receive the tangible elements of the sacrament. These are the words to that prayer:

Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament.

I love you above all things, and I desire to possess you within my soul.

And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart.

I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people gathered around every altar of your Church, and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul.

Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
