

FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

PRAYING THE NOVENA OF THE HOLY SPIRIT IN ADVANCE OF PENTECOST

At a recent Wednesday evening discipleship class, I was asked about the Holy Spirit novena. For the past few years, this devotion has been offered to our family of faith to pray in the nine days between the Ascension of our Lord and the Day of Pentecost. When I first offered this devotion to any willing to pray daily with me for nine days, I expected a couple of people to join me. In actuality, over a dozen people participated the first year, and last year, we were just shy of two dozen participants. This truly amazes me but what really does my heart good is to have a parishioner approach me and enthusiastically ask if we can do it again.

Of course we can do it again! This year, the Feast of the Ascension is Thursday, May 18. That means, from Friday, May 19 through Saturday, May 27, prayer warriors wishing to be a part of this beautiful discipline can pray together (virtually) during the nine days in the lead up to the celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit to birth the Church as we read about in Acts 1 and celebrate on Pentecost Sunday, May 28.

You may be wondering what exactly a novena is, and more specifically, what a Novena to the Holy Spirit entails. Very good questions. Here are some answers.

The concept of a novena is taken straight out of Holy Scripture. We see in Acts 1 that the disciples "all joined together constantly in prayer, along with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brothers." This period of prayer and waiting lasted for nine days, at which time was witnessed the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost. The word *novena* comes to us from the Latin *novem* meaning nine.

The disciples prayerfully spent their time awaiting the coming of the Holy Spirit. It is the Holy Spirit who would come and empower them to continue Jesus' mission of spreading the Gospel to the ends of the earth. The disciples would have spent much of this time not only in prayer, but likely also in reflection, discussion, and seeking guidance and direction from God.

Over the 2,000 year history of the Church, many different novenas have been composed and prayed for many different reasons and causes. But the original novena is a Novena to the Holy Spirit we see in Acts 1.

The Holy Spirit Novena we will pray is based in large part on a novena liturgy found in the Anglican *St. Augustine Prayer Book*. While the structure and rhythm of the novena is roughly the same each day, the special intentions offered each day for the Church, change so that on each of the nine days of prayer, participants are praying a different petition, asking God's help for a different area of the greater Church's mission and ministry. The nine distinct petitions are as follows:

Day 1: For the welfare of Christ's Church throughout the world and the welfare of Good Shepherd Church

Day 2: For persecuted Christians throughout the world

Day 3: For churches around the globe forced to meet underground

Day 4: Thanksgiving for the lives of those who, like St. Stephen, were martyred for the One, True, Faith

Day 5: For those churches closing forever and for churches that could carry on their light

Day 6: For the strength of Christian clergy everywhere to hold their churches together, especially in the midst of this troubled world

Day 7: For those churches and parishioners in the Anglican Church in North America, especially those in our Anglican Diocese of the Western Gulf Coast

Day 8: For churches, congregations, and Christians under the influence of false teachers

Day 9: For Christian clergy throughout the world, that they would remain faithful to the Word and Sacraments of Christ's Church

In the coming days, a link will be made available on our website that will allow folks to sign up to be a part of the Holy Spirit Novena through Good Shepherd Anglican Church. Participants will simply register their name and email address. On the morning of May 19, the first of nine emails will arrive in the participants inbox. In the text of the email will be liturgy of the novena for the participant to read and pray. There will also be a link in the email for those who like to pray along with another. Using that link will cause your computer or device to play an audio of the novena for that day. Emails will come first thing each morning over the course of the nine days.

The Holy Spirit Novena serves as a model for Christians today who seek to deepen their faith and relationship with God. It reminds us of the importance of prayer, reflection, and waiting on God's timing. Through prayer and waiting, we can open ourselves up to the guidance and empowerment of the Holy Spirit in our lives. I pray you will consider being a part of this powerful devotion.

We appreciate the congregation's support.




ALL NIGHT PRAYER VIGIL

PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Since the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown began, Good Shepherd Church has been streaming our 10:00 AM Sunday morning Service of Holy Eucharist each week. During the distribution of Holy Communion, the lector reads a prayer entitled ***An Act of Spiritual Communion*** for those who are watching at home and are unable to partake in the reception of Holy Communion sacramentally. That beautiful prayer comes from the Book of Common Prayer (pg. 677, ACNA 2019) and can be prayed by a Christian any time they are longing for the grace of Holy Communion but are unable to receive the tangible elements of the sacrament. These are the words to that prayer:

***Dear Jesus, I believe that you
are truly present in the Holy Sacrament.
I love you above all things,
and I desire to possess you within my soul.
And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally,
I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart.
I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people
gathered around every altar of your Church,
and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul.
Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.***
