

FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

AN ATTITUDE OF GRATITUDE

WOW! Can you believe how quickly the summer is passing? I remember as a kid, summer off from school seemed like an eternity (albeit one with an end date—as distant as it always seemed up until the very last moment).

As I've gotten older, I am finding myself purposely having to make certain that I am doing a better job at recognizing the various seasons of life that are in the very moment, lest I end up speaking about them as I observe them in the rearview mirror. In other words, in my prayer life, I am allowing God to show me how to be less concerned about the next season (or project, or trip, or book, or month) and more concerned with the very present gift of now.

And this is my thesis for you, dear reader: *now* is literally a gift from God. The preciousness of this very moment is beyond the tangible and beyond value. Yet if you're like me, and you're honest with yourself, you are spending virtually none of your life in the present moment. Instead, you're worried about something or many things that are down the road. And the thing is, most of what you are worrying about is either so far beyond your control that your worry is folly OR you are worrying about something that will not even come to pass. Jesus in fact warns of this snare of daily life in Matthew's gospel account when he says "do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own" (Matthew 6:34).

Something tells me that I'll be meandering through the theme of "now" in my own prayer life and perhaps in my preaching. But suffice it to say, I believe God's gift of *NOW* is truly only able to be fully received and enjoyed through an attitude of grati-tude—that is, through thanksgiving.

Each week, during the liturgy of the Eucharist (sidenote: *Eucharist* is from the Greek word meaning *thanksgiving*), just after we have all prayed *the Memorial Acclamation* (i.e., Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.), I, as the priest, pray aloud a prayer known as *the Epiclesis*. In this prayer, the priest addresses God the Father, on behalf of the people, and through the Name of Jesus, petitioning Him to send down the Holy Spirit upon the ordinary gifts of bread and wine. You'll probably recognize the words of the prayer:

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving (emphasis added) and we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Word and Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

In that very moment of NOW, by faith, we accept that God has acted upon the common elements upon His Altar—His Table of Sacrifice—and having received the only true spiritual offering we can make—that of *praise and thanksgiving*—God the Father, in the power of the Holy Spirit, has caused the fullness of His presence to be available through His Son Jesus Christ in the elements of bread and wine. How does this happen? As the prayer concludes, we receive the answer of how all this happens as the celebrant, on behalf of the people, praises God for this miraculous act. It happens through God the Son who instituted the sacrament. It happens *through Jesus*, who is eternally in union with God the Father and God the Holy Spirit, as the prayer says...

By him (Jesus), and with him (Jesus), and in him (Jesus), in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and forever. Amen.

I'll go ahead and conclude my column for the month at this point but would also encourage the reader to explore my pastoral letter of thanksgiving to all who contributed to the success of our Vacation Bible School.

FOOTBALL POOL SQUARES NOW AVAILABLE!





PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Since the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown began, Good Shepherd Church has been streaming our 10:00 AM Sunday morning Service of Holy Eucharist each week. During the distribution of Holy Communion, the lector reads a prayer entitled **An Act of Spiritual Com***munion* for those who are watching at home and are unable to partake in the reception of Holy Communion sacramentally. That beautiful prayer comes from the Book of Common Prayer (pg. 677, ACNA 2019) and can be prayed by a Christian any time they are longing for the grace of Holy Communion but are unable to receive the tangible elements of the sacrament. These are the words to that prayer:

Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to possess you within my soul. And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart. I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people gathered around every altar of your Church, and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
