THE LIFE CHANGING NEWS:

EASTER AND THE HOPE OF THE RESURRECTION

Easter, which commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, is more than just an historical event. It is a transformative narrative of hope—a hope that not only changes lives, but is instilled in the hearts of believers. The life changing good news of Easter is that Christ has risen, and because He has risen, we too shall rise.

NOTES FROM RINDA

Alleluia! He is risen! The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!

After the Lenten season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, we enter the season of Easter, the most special season of the Liturgical year. We have abstained from speaking or singing the word "Alleluia" during the penitential season of Lent. The word "Alleluia" means "God be praised" and it is definitely an expression of exuberance at the observation of the resurrection of Christ.

The hymn "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today" has in each of its stanzas a sentence followed by an

Alleluia. With each successive line of the hymn the excitement builds. Anglican priest turned Methodist hymn writer Charles Wesley wrote the text which was published in 1739. After several different settings, the tune that we use today was finally settled upon.

The final stanza combines the symbols of the cross of redemption, the grave, and the skies of eternal life.

Wishing you a blessed Resurrection Sunday!

Let us sing with the joy of the resurrection filling our hearts.

Alleluia! He is risen indeed!

Soar we now where Christ has led, Alleluia! Following our exalted Head. Alleluia! Made like him, like him we rise, Alleluia! Ours the cross, the grave, the skies, Alleluia!

WILL YOU BE LIKE SIMON?


While there are numerous amazing figures in the Bible, perhaps my favorite is Simon of Cyrene. Why? Because on Jesus' grueling walk carrying His own cross to Calvary, he became so weak that he fell to the ground under its weight. Luke's Gospel says, "And as they led Him away, they seized one Simon of Cyrene, who was coming in from the country, and laid on

him the cross, to carry it behind Jesus."

Some also spiritualize Simon's conveyance of Jesus' cross in relation to how we as believers are to "bear our own crosses" as we follow Jesus. Simon of Cyrene provides us with an example of what that looks like. It's not easy to follow Jesus. Simon most likely received taunts and insults just as Jesus did.

This all leads me to the importance of the cross at Good Shepherd and the great Anglican tradition of the procession. The idea of the procession is straightforward: we are gathering for worship from our outside daily lives and are approaching God through Christ. Therefore, the cross goes before us. As we leave, we are being sent back out into the world, with the cross leading the way.

In that spirit, it is my belief that having a crucifer (the person who leads the procession by carrying the processional cross) each and every Sunday is



essential. Ever since I was an acolyte as a kid, I always considered it an honor to carry the cross in the procession. The same honor of service holds true for choir members, lectors, chalice bearers, those who work with our children, gift bearers, the sexton, our music director, etc.

Unfortunately, my church attendance has not been what I'd like it to be! When I'm not here for Holy Eucharist, we need someone to carry the cross in the procession and recessional. I assure you that it's not that heavy. While I hope to improve my attendance, I also hope that when Fr. Randall asks for someone to carry the cross, they will say yes. And for those who are wondering if they can really do it, I am always available for tips and pointers, and yes, you can do it!

Stay tuned for more news on the procession to include acolytes carrying torches, the choir, and a banner-bearer!

Keynote Speaker: Jenny Noyes

Jenny says, as a global networker, it has been my privilege to lead New Wineskins since 2016. New Wineskins is an Anglican mission-mobilizing agency and host of the New Wineskins Global Mission Conferences. Before my tenure with New Wineskins, I helped Alpha courses spread throughout the U.S. and overseas over the past 30+ years, working as Southeast Director for Alpha USA from 2009-2012. I also served as director of evangelism, missions and outreach at an Anglican church plant in Northern Virginia for nine years, where we used Alpha extensively to reach our community and grow the church. 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PRAYING AN ACT OF SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

Since the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown began, Good Shepherd Church has been streaming our 10:00 AM Sunday morning Service of Holy Eucharist each week. During the distribution of Holy Communion, the lector reads a prayer entitled **An Act of Spiritual Com***munion* for those who are watching at home and are unable to partake in the reception of Holy Communion sacramentally. That beautiful prayer comes from the Book of Common Prayer (pg. 677, ACNA 2019) and can be prayed by a Christian any time they are longing for the grace of Holy Communion but are unable to receive the tangible elements of the sacrament. These are the words to that prayer:

Dear Jesus, I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to possess you within my soul. And since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I beseech you to come spiritually into my heart. I unite myself to you, together with all your faithful people gathered around every altar of your Church, and I embrace you with all the affections of my soul. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.
